The Honble Petition of the Planters and
Principal Inhabitants of Conception Bay.

MEMORANDUM.

That for several years past it has been a
custom in this Bay for the Merchants and Planters by
their delegates to settle Prices of Fish Oil &c; this
custom has been since the markets in St. John's
became so exceedingly variable that it left us in the
most uncertainty. Therefore the present mode was
adopted for settlement.

That there had been instance a few years ago
in this Bay when the Merchants and Planters had agreed
to give eleven shillings and three pence per quintal
for fish; one merchant settled the account with his

dealers at ten shillings per quintal during the
Justice and commonalty.

That last year when we were upon settling the
prices as at present we offered the merchants to abide
by the price broken at St. John's for fish; and to pay
more for goods but then they thought proper to reject
our proposal because fish was then fifteen shillings
and six pence, and here they had it after some
alteration from us for Fourteen shillings and six
pence and fifteen shillings and six pence per quintal.

That this makes the price of fish at St. John's
being low, because the usual adventures in the trade
who buy fish for sale or exchange, are not yet
arrived; this induced the merchants here, to offer the
St. John's settlement to us, which settlement they
rejected with disdain last year because fish was high
in demand there.

That we proposed and offered in the presence
of Your Excellency's Surrogate to abide always or for
five years a crossing by the prices broken at St. John's
but this proposal also was rejected.

That it is no hardship for us to stop

from delivering fish to the merchants, before a settlement is made, for it has been the custom for years past because we do not choose to leave ourselves and families exposed to the arbitrary charges and capricious settlements which different traders may think proper to adopt.

That thereforeas our last resource are with an earnest desire to have a thing of this public nature properly settled by lawful authority and not by a confused assembly of the people, we fly to Your Excellency for protection and only desire that two or three Delegates may be chosen by us and a like number of merchants chosen fro this our body by them to settle the prices for the present and in future and in this case to appoint the Chief Magistrate here as a final arbitrator or umpire in case of disagreement this or any other method for the common good which

Your Excellency shall please to adopt shall be joyfully received and cause Your Excellency's petitioners ever to pray.
